### LETTER FROM THE SELECTMEN

Some town elections and meetings are pretty routine. This is not one of those years. This year there are important issues the Dublin voters will decide upon, and some of them take study. Two involve monetary opportunities that will not be available again. It is a tribute to the hard work of the Planning Board that the state and government even noticed a town of our size, let alone offered to help fund a project. But the issues are complex and require understanding in order to make an informed decision, pro or con.

The spark behind this flurry of activity is an unexpected interest in our town from developers and the increasing need to protect our natural resources. As our moratorium on multiple building sites comes to a close, several developers have announced their intension to create large subdivisions here. Will that be good for Dublin? How would a series of developments affect our water, our roads, our schools, our community?

If gradual growth is our aim, how best to achieve that end? If all-out growth is desired, that too, can be decided.

The voters will find several choices at the ballot box and at town meeting. If you've been unable to attend the many open board meetings, try to come to the pre-town meeting on March 7.

This year, of all years, an informed public is needed.

To be voted on Tuesday March 14, 2006 from 8:00am until 7:00pm in the Lower Level of Dublin Town Hall.

#### Article 1

To bring the ballots for the following officers:

#### Article 2

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend "Article VI, Section C: 1" to change the minimum lot size in the Mountain District from two (2) to eight (8) acres. The intent of this change is to preserve views and natural resources and to limit the density of growth in the Mountain District.

#### Article 3

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend "Article VII, Section B: 1" to change the minimum lot size in the Rural District from two (2) to four (4) acres. The intent of this change is to limit the density of growth in the Rural District.

#### Article 4

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To adopt "Article XXV, Conservation Subdivision Ordinance," as authorized in RSA 674:21. This will permit the Planning Board to approve

flexible subdivision designs, encouraging efficiency in the location and design of residential developments, roads, facilities and infrastructure, and create open space to be preserved in perpetuity.

#### Article 5

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To adopt the updated "Article XVIII, Wetland Conservation District," which includes the definition of "wetlands" required by the State of New Hampshire, extends the buffer between a wetland and a building to be the same as that currently required by Article XVIII for septic (100 feet), and provides for an appeal process.

#### Article 6

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Selectmen for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To adopt "Article XXVI, Residential Building Code" thereby establishing the International Residential Building Code as the standard for residential construction in Dublin, as authorized by RSA 155-A. This will hold all new residential construction to the standards in this nationally accepted model code, permit the issuance of building permits, and provide for an appeal process.

#### Article 7

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the town Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To adopt various administrative changes that include adding and updating definitions, and clarifying that the purpose of the Mountain District is to protect the environment.

#### Article 8

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #7 submitted by petition for the town Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend "Article IX, Table of Use Regulations, 5:B.3.a" so that in the

Rural District, health care facilities where the principal use is located in one or more buildings would be a "Permitted" use. The current regulation allows this use only after receiving a "Special Exception" from the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

(Submitted by petition)

#### **Article 9**

To see if the Town will vote in favor of the adoption of Amendment #8 submitted by petition for the town Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend "Article III, General Provisions Applicable to All Districts, Section E" to allow educational and health care facilities within fifteen hundred (1,500) feet of Dublin Lake. The current regulation does not allow these facilities within 1,500 feet of Dublin Lake.

To be voted on Saturday March 18, 2006 at 9:00am at the Dublin Consolidated School

#### **Article 10**

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

#### **Article 11**

To choose all necessary officers, Measurer of Wood and Bark and Memorial Day Committee, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### **Article 12**

To authorize the prepayment of taxes and to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payment in prepayment of taxes in accordance with RSA 80:52A, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### **Article 13**

To accept the operating budget submitted by the Budget Committee and to raise and appropriate the \$1,685,980 exclusive of the amounts contained in all other articles in this warrant.

#### **Article 14**

To enter into a long term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$162,500 to purchase a 10 Wheel Dump Truck payable over a term of five (5) years at a rate of \$36,500 per year; and to raise and appropriate \$36,500 for the first payment to be made in 2006, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$36,500 from the Heavy Highway Trust Fund for the first of the five (5) annual payments. (This article requires a 2/3 vote) (There is no "escape clause")

#### **Article 15**

To appropriate \$24,000 to hire the State of New Hampshire Department of Geology to create a hydrogeology map of the Bedrock in Dublin for the purpose of locating and protecting the aquifers that supply Dublin's drinking water. This project has received an additional \$34,446 in grants from state and federal sources.

#### **Article 16**

To appropriate \$2,000 to hire the State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services to test well water throughout the town in order to produce a town-wide map of water quality and to provide citizens with a comprehensive analysis of their drinking water. The cost to citizens who wish to participate will be \$120 or less

#### **Article 17**

To raise and appropriate \$13,000 to install an exhaust system at the Town Highway Garage and to withdraw \$6,000 from the Remediation Expendable Trust Fund.

#### **Article 18**

To appropriate \$64,000 to purchase Transfer Station Equipment, including:

a)	Forklift	\$25,000.00
b)	Bailer	\$15,000.00
c)	Compactor	\$20,000.00
d)	Installation	\$ 4,000.00

and to authorize the withdrawal of \$60,000 from the Recycling Fund for the purchase of the equipment only.

#### **Article 22**

To create an Expendable Trust Fund to be known as the Revaluation Expendable Trust Fund and to name the Board of Selectmen as agents for same, and to appropriate \$12,000 to be deposited in the Fund with this amount coming from the Town's Unreserved Fund Balance as of December 31, 2005.

#### **Article 23**

To adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 which states: "Every inhabitant who is legally blind as determined by the Blind Services Program, Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Education shall be exempt each year on the assessed value, for property tax purposes, of his or her residential real estate to the value of Fifteen Thousand dollars (\$15,000)." and that this provision for such exemption shall take effect on March 20, 2006 and be in effect for the 2006 Tax Year.

**OPINION:TWO IMPORTANT ZONING ISSUES**

Two of the zoning articles to be voted on the election day ballot (March 14) have been submitted by petition on behalf of Michael Beavers, the former owner of Beech Hill Hospital. Both would change long-established land uses in town. Both will not be recommended by the Selectmen and the Planning Board. The first of these articles [Article 1] would make "health care facilities" using more than one building a Permitted use in the Rural District. The existing zoning ordinance allows this use only by Special Exception. The proposed amendment would make no change in the present requirement of a Special Exception for a health care facility in a single building.

This article, if passed, would mean that the builder of a hospital, drug rehabilitation clinic, or some other "health care facility" in a single building would still have to apply for a Special Exception, but as long as it required more than one building, he could go ahead without review. With no requirement for a Special Exception, abutters would not be notified of the proposed facility and would have no chance to comment.

After a public hearing, the Planning Board decided on January 19 not to recommend this article because it is contrary to the comprehensive zoning strategy of the town. The Board also noted that the article, by Mr. Beavers' own testimony, was proposed for the benefit of his property on Beech Hill. The Board's minutes continue: "The Board agreed that it would be irresponsible to rezone over half the town for the benefit of one parcel."

The second petition article [Article 2] would amend the present exclusion of commercial enterprises within 1500 feet of Dublin Lake, so as to permit "educational or health care facilities". Again, after public hearing, the Planning Board voted not to recommend this article, recording in its minutes:

"The board noted that this buffer zone has been legally in effect for 43 years and de facto in effect for more than a century. Its purpose is to protect the watershed around the lake and the views of Monadnock and other natural features. . . .

"The board agreed that this amendment, if passed, would violate the purpose of the 1500 foot buffer; had the potential to harm the environment around Dublin Lake and to degrade the viewshed, which all who drive by Dublin Lake enjoy."

## BUSINESS OF THE MONTH: RUBBER STAMPS OF AMERICA

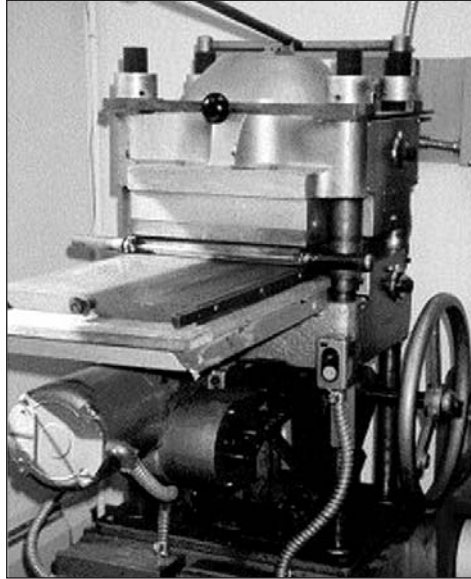

**R**ubber Stamps of America is a name that belies its creative and artistic orientation. The company, started in Saxton's River, VT, was purchased five years ago by Karen Polo, and moved to Dublin in 2004, when Karen and her husband John Munn purchased Rick and Barbara O'Connor's house on Main Street.

Karen grew up in Keene, and John, a city planner, has gladly transplanted his roots from Washington, D.C.

Karen is the driving force behind the business. On a tour you can see her pressing rubber, trimming stamps, indexing blocks, and mounting, storing, and packing orders. In the office Karen answers the phone, mails catalogs, works with the artists, lays out catalogs, does the bookwork, and updates the web site!

The traditional business of rubber pads and ink has been declining due to greater use of the internet and e-mail. When Karen bought the business, the sellers noted that trend, and indeed today, self-inking stamps have been growing and

traditional rubber pads declining. And yet hard stamping is surviving, in part due to the need for individual identity. Intricate images, some by

noted designers, are computer-generated. This allows for more creative and personalized stamps.

This need for personalization and creativity has opened new markets for what has otherwise been a traditional business.

Major parts of RSA's business include wedding invitations, hand stamps for bar owners, concert promoters. Industrial stamps, used on non-porous surfaces, is yet another product offering.

Recently requests for classes have come from those who want to make their own artistic stamps. Scrapbook users, for example, want to make their own custom stamps, for individual pages, and images.

Digital photography has made scrapbook photos much easier to produce. In the next five years, Karen would like to offer more courses because she enjoys bringing people together.

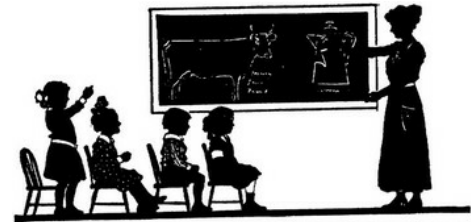

## IN REMEMBRANCE: STEVE KNAPP

Steve Knapp, a long time Dublin resident, passed away recently but left a lasting legacy to this town and to all of us who knew him. Steve served many years as a selectman and on the budget committee. He was also an active member of the Dublin Community Church where he held many positions and was a valuable member of the choir.

Steve could be very blunt—he held nothing back, but he also had a positive outlook that inspired a person to take a risk, say what needs to be said and trust that it will all work out. And it usually did with Steve. I can't ever remember being mad at him about anything. He was just too nice a guy. Steve brought out the best in people—even if he did stir up emotions on occasion.

We served many years together on the old executive committee of the church. Steve and I generally agreed with each other—the only problem was sometimes we couldn't get too many others to agree with us. Often, after our late meetings, he would say why don't you come back to the house and we'll talk some more. Steve's wife Judy would usually still be awake and, as you can guess, quite willing also to participate in the discussion. As the hours would tick away on those late nights, we would resolve not only church issues but also town, state, national

and the occasional world issue.

That was Steve, a guy who not only was a great talker but a great listener. Time didn't really matter to him those evenings or later on when we served together as selectmen. Those of you who also had the pleasure of serving with him know what I mean. Everything Steve said usually made a lot of sense. He could also make sense of just about anything I said. I do think that sometimes he could explain what I was trying to

say much better than I could. I always appreciated that.

Steve had already served a few years on the Town Budget Committee. But when I was a selectman I was able to convince Steve to be chairman of the Town committee to expand the elementary school and have some more recreational land. Sounds like a pretty plum job except it involved eminent domain, an elderly widow, and a lot of controversy.

Steve loved this town and he served it so well. He was passionate, dedicated, conscientious and as hard working a town official as you will ever find. He knew the art of compromise but also when to stand on principle. He didn't take shortcuts—he was always well prepared and ready to hash it out even if it meant selectmen's meetings that lasted until midnight or beyond.

I remember Steve often saying to me "Bruce, that's just not right". He'd be describing something somebody had said or done. He had such a fine sense of morality. He was always committed to the truth and doing the right thing even if it wasn't easy. He also had a sense of humor that could put everyone at ease.

Steve Knapp was a good town servant, a great friend, and simply just a fine man and I'm going to miss him a lot. We need more Steve Knapp's in this world.
