Budget Hearing Minutes February 14, 2023

Hearing held in person and via Zoom, called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Chair Gurney. The public notice that appeared in the *Monadnock Ledger Transcript* on February 2, 2023 was read.

Chair Gurney introduced committee members and thanked Kate, the Selectboard and Department heads for their support. The committee met with all committee chairs and department heads. The budget proposed was kept as low as possible while still meeting the needs of the Town. However, employee wages were up 5%, electricity up 70%, as well as increases in fuel costs.

Bill explained that the total operating expense budget was \$2,469,696-\$142,502 over the 2022 budget or an increase of 6.12%. Revenue was estimated at \$809,458. If all warrant articles were approved as recommended the total budget would be \$3,049,182, 8.48% higher than 2022.

Bill reviewed the expense budget by department:

Warrant Article #6: Capital Reserve - \$335,000. Recommended

- Warrant Article #7: Chip seal town roads- \$100,000. \$100,000 to come from the road construction capital reserve fund. Recommended.
- Warrant article: #8: Repair of wood rot damage to Library front entrance and chimney \$35,500-\$20,000 to come from the Library major maintenance & repair capital reserve. Recommended.
- Warrant article #9: Purchase and installation of a Minotaur air treatment system to control humidity in the basement-\$13,500. Recommended
- Warrant article # 10: Contingency fund for unanticipated expenses from oil related volatility-\$15,000 to come from the unassigned fund balance. The \$15,000 will be returned to the general fund if not used. Recommended.
- Warrant article #11: Insulation for the loft area, equipment bays and second floor meeting room at the firehouse in order to save of energy costs-\$20,000. Recommended
- Warrant Article #12: Replacement of 2 Highway garage doors to save energy costs-\$16,000. The cost of these doors keeps rising the longer the purchase is put off. Recommended.

Warrant Article #13: Dublin Advocate - \$3,600. Recommended.

Warrant Article #14: Health & Welfare Agencies - \$7,986. Recommended.

Sterling Abram asked why the change of heart of this article. Bill explained that more residents were relying on these services and that the Selectboard had set an \$8,000 limit for this article.

Warrant Article #15: Expendable Trust Funds - \$7,400. Recommended

- Warrant Article #16: Establish and fund a new Capital Reserve Fund for maintenance and repair of Town owned infrastructure, like parking lots, sidewalks, drainage, railings, etc. and to name the Selectboard as agents for this fund- \$10,000. Recommended.
- Warrant Article #17: Acquisition of a deeded permanent right-of-way over the General Store property for driveway access to town owned property occupied by the Post Office. \$40,000. Recommended.
- Warrant Article #18: Purchase and installation of security cameras for 3 town buildings (Highway garage, Solid Waste facility and Archives building). \$15,500. This is the first phase of this project. Recommended.

Chris Sprague said the Library building was an important building and that it also needed cameras. He questioned who would install these cameras. This project only has quotes at this point-the cameras will be put out to bid.

Kate mentioned that Town reports should be available at the Dublin Women's Community Club sponsored pre-town meeting forum on March 7.

There being no further business, motion by Susie, seconded by K to adjourn. Passed 5-0. The hearing adjourned at 8:01 p.m.
